## TEACHING & LEARNING NEWS

#### **Year 5 PESE presentation:**

On Tuesday, Mr Thomas talked through the Kent Test process for children who will be attending Year 6 in September 2024 (current Year 5). The presentation slides can be found as an attachment alongside this newsletter. Within these slides, you will find key dates and an overview of the test. Online registration opens on Monday 3<sup>rd</sup> June and closes on Monday 1<sup>st</sup> July. We will share a link to the website in the first newsletter in term 6.

Over the coming months, secondary schools will be releasing dates for open events for Year 7 admissions in September 2025 (current Year 5). There are a number of routes to consider,









including independent schools such as St Lawrence college. A flyer for their open events is attached alongside this newsletter. They offer a wide variety of scholarships and the opportunity for means tested support through bursaries.

#### Year 4 Multiplication Tables Check (MTC)

Next term, Year 4 will be participating in the Multiplication Tables Check (MTC). It is a statutory national assessment to check whether children can fluently recall their times tables up to 12. This is a key skill that will help support your child's progress in Maths. It is an online assessment that consists of 2 practice questions followed by 25 times tables questions. They will have 6 seconds to answer each question. On average, the check should take no longer than 5 minutes. The MTC will be carried out on Wednesday 12th June. Schools will receive the results on Monday 24th June and your child's results will be shared with you. It is important to note that there is no pass mark for this assessment. It is a national check carried out for the purpose of allowing schools to identify any pupils who may need additional support. However, the national average score last year was 20/25 and the most common score was 25/25.

The children in Year 4 have been working incredibly hard this year to learn their times tables and have had opportunities each week to practise carrying out the check. Fluent recall of times tables facts will be hugely beneficial as your child moves further through their Maths curriculum. We ask for your support in encouraging your child to continue practising their times tables at home. Times Tables Rock Stars has been great for this so please continue to encourage your child to engage with this platform. However, it doesn't have to involve electronic devices. Some of the children will have flashcards of key facts they've yet to master, so just spend a few minutes a day going through them or fire some questions off around the dinner table or during their bedtime routine. The confidence gained by those children who have really grasped their tables in Maths has been fantastic to see - the subject becomes more accessible, the children are more successful and, as a result, they are enjoying their Maths lessons more and remembering more. Multiplication Tables Check -2023 - Timestables.co.uk is a website where children can practise a times table check similar to the assessment they will be completing in June; it is set out using the same format of answering 25 questions with 6 seconds to answer each question.

## **Holiday Reminders**

With the lighter evenings and school holiday, it's easy to drop routines and be more relaxed about bedtimes. These changes can greatly affect a child's ability to manage leading to a higher frequency of dysregulation. Try to maintain expectations such as

mealtimes and bedtimes to support your child in maintaining calm.

#### **Encouraging Healthy Friendships**

It's common for young people to have comparatively less of an understanding of social conventions. While children can benefit from this to some degree – making friends at the drop of a hat – this can also generate a good deal of confusion regarding certain aspects of any relationships that they form. Navigating the complexities of childhood and adolescent friendships can be challenging - but with the right guidance, children and young people can cultivate meaningful, supportive relationships, some of which can last for many years.

The guide attached explores friendships between children and young people, offering advice on how to help them nurture healthy relationships with one another. It is important to remember, however, that each child is different, and will require an individual approach to relationship support.

## MR FOREMAN'S ECO CORNER

Wind power provides the largest source of UK electricity over winter months

Well, I didn't expect this, but a new study ranks the UK top in the global league table for decarbonisation.

Wind power was Britain's largest single source of electricity last winter. Over the six months between October last year and March 2024, the UK's fleet of wind



turbines supplied more electricity than any other power source.

During the first quarter of this year alone, wind provided 33 per cent of the UK's power, just ahead of gas on 28.8 per cent, while imports provided almost 15 per cent, biomass almost 7 per cent, and solar 2.5 per cent. Coal provided just 1.4 per cent of electricity. Further data for this April shows wind power on average provided more power than gas over the past year, making this a new milestone for the technology.

A league table of the world's 30 largest countries that emit more than 200 million tons of CO2 per year places the UK at the top spot for cutting its carbon emissions: 52 per cent since the country's emissions peaked in 1971.



That places the UK ahead of any other major country in terms decarbonisation. France sits in second place after cutting its CO2 emissions by almost 45 per cent and Germany is the only









other nation to have achieved emissions reductions of over 40 per cent.

No other major economy has cut its carbon emissions faster than the UK, which is a real achievement. A large part of the progress has been phasing out coal-fired power stations and investing in renewables. However, even with the last remaining coal plant closing in the UK later this year, we will still need to find new ways to meet the government's 2050 net zero ambitions.

But what a great start the UK has made, this is something we can all be truly proud of. Long may it continue.
