

MR FOREMAN'S ECO CORNER

Dead as a Dodo



A while back, I was told that every minute that passes, one species on earth becomes extinct. That's 10,080 forms of life every week. I never really took much notice of it as I thought that can't be true. But this week I thought I'd have a look and see how much truth there is to this urban myth.

Firstly, we don't know exactly what's out there or how many species there are. It's a big and complex world and we discover new species all the time.

So, if we don't know how much there is to begin with, we don't know exactly how much we're losing. Estimates put the number of species on our planet between 2-100 million, that's quite a









big range. But we do have lots of facts and figures that seem to indicate that the extinction rate isn't good.

To give you an idea, let's go through one scientific analysis. The rapid loss of species we are seeing today is estimated by experts to be between 1,000 and 10,000 times higher than the natural extinction rate. This higher extinction rate is due to human activity.

These experts calculate that between 0.01 and 0.1% of all species will become extinct each year.

If the low estimate of the number of species out there is true - i.e. that there are around 2 million different species on our planet - then that means between 200 and 2,000 extinctions occur every year (3-38 species a week). But, if the upper estimate of species numbers is true - that there are 100 million different species coexisting with us on our planet - then between 10,000 and 100,000 species are becoming extinct each year (19-1923 a week).

Even if you take the top of the estimated limit it's not near the 1-a-minute statement that I was told, but it's still quite a sobering thought.

And what's the impact of fewer and fewer spices on our planet? It is a bit complex, but generally it boils down to the food chain.

The lack of smaller insects due to a smaller diversity of vegetation means that larger animals have less food to eat resulting in a decline of their numbers and so on and so forth until it reaches us at the top of the food chain. This is a really simplified example but you see the impact it could have on us as a species. This is why it's so important to ensure a large and



rich biodiversity and why so much effort goes into projects such as wild flower meadows and reforestation projects. Being green isn't just about recycling and energy saving, it's about looking after the plants and animals that we share the world with too.

Eco dates this week

Plastic Free July

Try to reduce how much plastic you buy during the month of July. Make a concerted effort to buy loose fruit and vegetables and plastic free versions of things you would normally buy.

Don't step on a bee day - 10th July

"Without the tireless work of our native bees in the UK, over a third of everything we eat would disappear from our tables. Bees are so vitally important for the planet's ecosystem, and yet they are still under threat like never before." How can you get involved? Obviously, don't step on a bee! But you can also plant wildflowers, avoid mowing your lawn so often and even learn about all the different bees that can be found in the UK.
